PUMPKIN SOUP WITH HONEY AND FETTA CROUTONS

SERVES 6

INGREDIENTS

1.5kg butternut or Jap pumpkin
1 bulb garlic
2 small capsicums halved
2 medium red onions quartered
2.5cm ginger, sliced thinly
¼ cup extra virgin oil
1 ½ tsp ground cumin
½ tsp dried chilli flakes (optional)
1.25lt water (5 cups)
2 tsp salt flakes
2 tbsp fresh flat leaf parsley



METHOD

Preheat oven to 190C/375F
Line a large roasting pan with baking paper.
Place cut pumpkin at one end of pan, cut side down, with the garlic.
Cover with foil, roast for 30 minutes.
Add capsicum cut side up, to roasting pan with onion and ginger. Drizzle with 1tbsp oil and sprinkle with cumin and chili. Roast uncovered a further 30 minutes or until pumpkin is tender.
Make honey, fetta croutons
Discard seed from pumpkin, scoop flesh into a blender or processor.
Add half the water, blend until smooth.
Add all other veges to mixture, squeeze garlic flesh into mixture with remainder of water and oil. Blend until smooth. Place mixture into a saucepan.
Stir soup over medium heat until heated through. Served topped with croutons and parsley.

HONEY FETTA CROUTONS

2 tbsp honey – warmed
2 tbsp olive oil
150g rustic baguette (thinly sliced)
50g vintage cheddar finely grated
100g fetta, crumbled.

Stir honey and oil in a large bowl, place baguette slices and toss to coat. Put slices on baking tray, sprinkle with cheeses and bake in hot oven for 10 mins till golden.

But what I love most is captured in the word 'monk' itself, the Greek root being 'monos', meaning 'alone' or 'only'. Not that monks are 'alone' (although sometimes they are) but that the monk's single-minded focus is God 'alone'.

Monastic life is a paradox. We might think that focussing on God alone leads to a narrow, isolated life, but the Desert Mothers and Fathers, Saints and Mystics have always known that precisely the opposite is true! It is from this God-centredness that all else flows. The more we concern ourselves *with* God, the more our concerns become those *of* God, loving and compassionate as we seek to care for our families, our friends, our work and our world. To the monastic heart, this makes all the difference. For the monk, mission is not the goal of the Christian church. Mission is the outcome of a God-centred life.

Take 'Rule' to mean 'guide' not rules and regulations.

Note that originally monks were both male and female. It is only later that the word 'nun' was introduced which is a derivative of the Italian word 'Nona' meaning old woman.

Monks, Monos and Mission – Monastic Spirituality for Everyday Life.

If, rarely, Christian monasteries come to mind, we might think of brown habited Brother Cadfaels or black and white clad Audrey Hepburns. Perhaps we consider monasteries a weird world of silence, hidden from society and irrelevant to modern day culture.

But monasticism is arguably the most enduring and influential spirituality the Christian world has ever known. It is responsible for many things we now take for granted; hospitals and universities being just two. And the little 6th century guidebook to monastic living known as the Rule of St Benedict, still popular in Western monasteries today, is increasingly relished by ordinary folk like you and me who don't live in monasteries at all!

Indeed, there are even those, like me, who are formally associated with monasteries even though we don't live there. Since 2015 I have been a Life Professed Sister of the Community of the Transfiguration, a community of monastics who live at the Holy Transfiguration Monastery in Teesdale, Victoria. And whilst my community's influence is a little more Eastern Orthodox than the Benedictine monasticism of the West, it is, as Benedict is, rooted in the deep spiritual wisdom of the Desert Mothers and Fathers that I love.

So, what is it that I and others find so enriching?

Well, monastic spirituality is about living ordinary life well in the presence of God. I include regular times of silence and solitude and a rhythm of prayer that provide balance to my busy life. There are spiritual practices that draw me closer to God and into deeper self-knowledge including Lectio Divina - the meditative reading of Scripture, as well as silent contemplative prayer. All this entwined within everyday life increases conscious awareness of God's love and presence in all things.

FRONTIER SERVICES (Bush Chaplains)



When National Director, Rob Floyd, spoke to a group of Bush Chaplains recently they told him stories which Rob said “had one thing in common and that was, they felt their country had forgotten them. Many people in the bush are reluctant to ask for help and our Bush Chaplains are often the first to see their distress and listen with an open heart to bring compassion, calm, competency and connection to show that people are not alone.”

Bush Chaplain, Rev David Jackson, Disaster Recovery, Midwest WA told the story of Robert, a hero of the Vietnam War, has chronic health issues and two years ago his property was in the path of the cyclone Seroja which hit WA. A lot of damage was done to his property which was uninsured. Robert needed a new roof, but Rev David said he also needed to know that he was not alone and that people care.

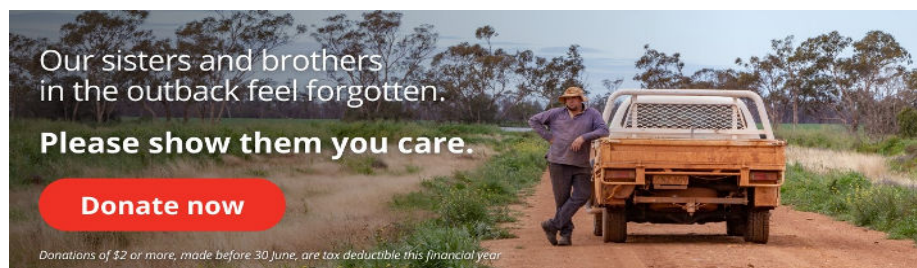
Bush Chaplain, Rev Erica “Ric” Payne, Disaster Recovery, Midwest WA is another Chaplain like Rev David. Ric’s immediate family lived right in the path of Cyclone Seroja and she told Rob that “as a Chaplain, I respond to needs and the need is simple: people need others to stand with them as they move to recovery. My ministry is as a listener, someone who cares and takes the time to be with another in their pain, trauma, and suffering or in their joy and celebration. I can help them manage whatever they are confronting or refer them to professional services. I meet folk as I move through the community and enjoy many cuppas with these incredibly beautiful people”.

Goldfields Bush Chaplain, Pastor Lindsay Ginn says: “There are many folk out here on the land that feel forgotten and abandoned. A visit from a Bush Chaplain can make a huge difference to ease their loneliness”.

Other Western Australian Bush Chaplains are: Pastor John Tomkins – Gascoyne. Rev Mitch Fialkowski – Murchison.

At present there is a vacancy for a Bush Chaplain in the – Pilbara.

REPORT ON THE MEETING OF PRESBYTERY SATURDAY 17TH JUNE 2023 at KALAMUNDA UNITING CHURCH

Fiona Bentley who shared a reflection on the possible future of the church presented the opening worship. Fiona spoke of the need to maintain/repair buildings, for fewer and fewer people and the buildings are less and less used. Abraham and Sarah were told to “get out there” and mission. The disciples were told to “get out there” in two’s (no buildings just faith and hope for the future through God). Just as in the times past, we are encouraged to connect better with our communities.

Of course Fiona was speaking in favour of the Thrive Mission Committee’s 25 year strategy planning. (my thoughts only).

Rev David Kriel was inducted into his new role at the church office.

In so far as attending Presbytery and Synod meetings is concerned becoming a member of both have changed slightly. No longer are congregational reps automatically reps for both presbytery and synod. For synod lay people must now register at presbytery by competing the necessary form and submitting it BEFORE lunch time at the presbytery AGM. This now means that for those lay personnel who have not registered by that time simply cannot attend synod!!

Life and Witness reviews should take place at every congregation every 5 years and not necessarily when the church is calling for a new minister.

Professional supervision costs usually would come out of a minister’s stipend but shortly it will be a recommendation that congregations pay for lay pastors to receive professional supervision. (The number of volunteer Pastors is increasing).

Sacramental training courses may soon be introduced ‘on-line’ as an option.

The 25 year mission and property strategy report was presented by Rev Greg Ross and members of Thrive. This led to a table group discussion within our own regions with feedback being presented to Thrive and placed on power point.

Some of the feedback looked at:

What kind of church are we?
Where can we go from here?
What resources do we have and what do we need?
Where do we fit in?
Can we have a relationship calling us to the future with the next generation?
Self identity "where we're at"

In relation to the 25year strategy plan and the many issues surrounding the concept of moving forward as a church (that is the church in general not Pinjarra). If we request Rev Rob Douglas will attend our church to discuss where we do fit in and what we can do as our part of the plan for the future.

The whole concept is to ensure that the church as a body will still be around in 25 years.

Rev Ivan Clarke suggested that should anyone like to use Lego his congregation at Noranda have an abundance of Lego and would be willing to let other congregations borrow some.

Certificates were presented to the two candidates for ministry who had completed their education and are now ready for calling and ordination.

Ballots were held for the various committee's of the church, all volunteers were elected.
