

What is Maundy Thursday?

Maundy Thursday is the day when Christians remember the Last Supper, when Jesus celebrated the Passover meal with his disciples before being betrayed and arrested. During the meal, Jesus took and blessed bread and wine and shared them with his disciples, calling the bread and wine his body and blood.

He urged the disciples to do the same after his death in memory of him, and indeed Christians have done so ever since at Holy Communion — also known as the Eucharist, The Lord's Supper or Mass. Maundy Thursday takes its name from the Latin word 'mandatum' meaning commandment. During the supper Jesus told his disciples: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." (John 13 v 34 —NRSV).

He also got up from the table and poured a basin of water and washed the disciples' feet. This was the act of a servant. He also told them to do the same for others. Many churches recreate this act at special services on Maundy Thursday as a reminder of how Jesus served others and of how Christians should also serve others. In medieval times it was common for kings and queens to take part in foot washing, as well as giving money and gifts, on Maundy Thursday. The practice was observed by Austro-Hungarian emperors right into the 20th Century. In England it developed into what is called the Royal Maundy Service in which the monarch distributes special coins, known as Maundy Money, which have kept much the same form since 1670. This is usually held at a different cathedral each year.

During King Charles first Royal Maundy Service of his reign was celebrated at York Minster where 74 men and 74 women (signifying his age) received the gift to thank them for outstanding Christian service and for making a difference to the lives of people in their local communities.

Recipe for April

COLCANNON

900G Brushed potatoes, peeled and roughly chopped

50g Butter

300g Savoy Cabbage, hard core removed, shredded

60 ml (1/4 cup) milk

60 ml pouring cream (substitute Greek yogurt if desired)

White pepper

METHOD:

- 1. Boil potatoes over medium heat until tender. Drain and return to pan. Use a potato masher and mash until smooth (a Ricer is preferred if available) Transfer to a large heatproof bowl.
- 2. Melt half the butter in a large saucepan over medium heat. Add the cabbage and cook, stirring occasionally, until the cabbage softens, about 7 minutes.
- 3. Add the mashed potato and remaining butter to pan and stir to combine. Gradually add the milk and cream/yogurt, stir to combine. Season with salt and white pepper. Place into a serving dish to serve.



SPECIAL MEETING OF SYNOD 3PM AT TRINITY NORTH UNITING CHURCH 22ND MARCH 2025

At the closing of our Presbytery meeting the General Secretary Rev Dr Andrew Williams took the chair.

He informed the meeting that due to the sensitivity of the subject matter, security personnel had been hired for the safety of members. Also it would be a closed meeting meaning that anyone attending the meeting must have a green card to enter. Green cards are a evidence on a person being eligible to attend by being a member of Synod.

Everyone then had to leave the premises and only those with green cards were allowed into the meeting.

Once members were seated, the General Secretary ordered the doors to be closed and secured with the security personnel guarding entry.

The Moderator Rev Dr Ian Tozer then took the chair then informed the meeting that Special Synod meetings are rare and unusual, but the matter at hand required an urgent decision from members.

Continued.....

The subject matter to be discussed and a decision made stems from what was commonly known as "Sister Kate's," now known as Congress and Beananing Kwuurt Insitute (BKI).

The land and property on where Sister Kate's operated was according to Alison Xamon "quite a large and substantial piece of land."

With the conception of the Uniting Church ALL properties came under their ownership. This particular land and property was subsequently given back to Congress and BKI in 2007.

Somewhere along the way the land was divide into two separate blocks, one was sold and has been developed, the remaining land is in the ownership of congress.

At the present time "squatters" have made the area their home some are indigenous some are white. The indigenous people involved are making a claim for Native Title.

Upon visiting the site recently the Moderator reported the atmosphere to be that of 'extreme hatred, bullying and much distress.'

A video was shown with the late Rev Celin Garlett being interviewed where he spoke of having a 'vision' for the land. His vision include a Healing Centre for people of the Stolen Generation a Spiritual place a Service Centre and Ministry a learning and development site, focusing on supporting those affected by the Stolen Generation.

With the sad passing of Rev Garlett congress struggled (for a while) and lost their self-determination resulting in neglect by the church to afford the correct line of support.

The current Board at BKI are considered to be irresponsible and are determined to sell the property ignoring the vision of the late Rev Garlett.

Continued...

Rev Garlett's wife and children were present, as were members of Congress, many of whom presented their case for rightful ownership of the land and for our support to allow Rev Garlett's vision to come to fruition.

More than one speaker spoke of "Lets not think about the past anymore lets move to the future together."

According to Alison Xamon, who is a lawyer, the current Western Australian Government have promised up to \$30m to support the vision enough to build the service centre and place of spiritual healing in accordance with Rev Garlett's vision.

Proposal: To agree to dissolve the current Board of BKI and replace them with elected members of Congress.

Agreed by consensus.

The meeting then sang Amazing Grace before the Moderator offered members of Congress an apology for taking so long to provide the church's support.

Meeting closed around 4.50pm

'I suspect now that the people currently squatting on the land will be evicted causing much friction. Also those indigenous people claiming Native Title may slow the process of Rev Garlett's vision . These are just my own thoughts.'
