

Recipe for September

CARROT SOUP (SERVES 5-6)

This soup is not just unusual, it's an excellent budget soup when carrots are plentiful.

1kg carrots

1/2kg potatoes

1/2kg onions

½ tsp ground ginger

½ tsp curry powder

Salt & Pepper to taste

34 - 1 cup milk or cream



6 cups chicken/vegetable stock -or 6 stock cubes + 6 cups water

Prepare and chop the vegies and add to stock. Boil all together with the ginger and curry powder until the vegies are tender – about 45 minutes. Turn off the heat and allow to cool slightly before blending. Return to saucepan to simmer. Season to taste and stir in milk or cream, bringing the soup up to temperature to serve. Do not boil after adding milk. Serve with crunchy bread.





Some interesting information

CHRISTIAN CROSSES

After Constantine converted to Christianity it became safe to be a Christian in the Roman Empire. The cross became the dominant symbol of the religion.

As Christianity spread to new regions the church (and the cross) would adapt to the local cultures.



LATIN CROSS

An international symbol of Christianity, the Latin Cross was once thought of as satanic by 19th century Protestant groups.



CROSS OF SAINT PETER

Saint Peter didn't want to be executed the same way as Jesus and requested to be crucified upside down.



PATRIARCHAL CROSS

Also called the "Cross of Lorraine" the top bar represents the plaque with the inscription "Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews".



PAPAL CROSS

The cross of the Pope, the three bars represent the Pope's rank as well as the Holy Trinity.



CELTIC CROSS

From the Gaelic speaking areas of the British Isles it's a combination of the local Druidic solar/lunar beliefs with the Christian cross.



CROSS PATTÉE

The Cross Pattée or "footed cross" has been a Christian cross for hundreds of years and was especially popular in the middle ages.



JERUSALEM CROSS

The coat of arms for the Kingdom of Jerusalem after the crusaders conquered it in the 13th century.



MALTESE CROSS

A heraldic cross from the middle ages and the Knights Hospitaller and the island of Malta



MACEDONIAN CROSS

Used in North Macedonia the four corners represent the four corners of the world, to which the Gospel must be proclaimed.



ST. ANDREW'S CROSS

Also called a saltire, Saint Andrew was crucified on an X shaped cross.



GLOBUS CRUCIGER

The "cross-bearing orb" is used to show Christ's reign over the world (which is a popular symbol in art).



RUSSIAN ORTHODOX CROSS

Like the Patriarchal Cross but with the addition of the foot bar at the bottom.

For Bush Chaplain Noel, Men's Mental Health Isn't a Hard Nut to Crack



In rural and remote communities, mental health challenges can often feel insurmountable—especially for men. But Bush Chaplain Noel Williams, serving Barwon, NSW, is breaking down barriers by helping men open up about their feelings. With over four decades of experience as a Chaplain, including time in the Defence Forces, Noel understands how to connect with people, particularly men who are often seen as reluctant to share their emotions.

Noel's personal journey of grief at a young age has helped him develop a deep empathy for others, and he uses that to create safe spaces for men to talk. "It's all about making a connection and listening—not just to what they say but to what's underneath the surface," he explains.

Promoting mental wellbeing is central to Noel's mission, as he works to address the unique challenges faced by men in rural communities. Higher rates of self-harm and suicide are often linked to the isolation and pressures of remote life, but Noel provides the tools for men to

and pressures of remote life, but Noel provides the tools for men to maintain their overall wellbeing. He uses frameworks that focus on emotional, social, spiritual, and physical health, often turning to strategies like mind mapping to help men think strategically and find solutions.

Noel also runs group sessions across his ministry area and offers individual support for those going through particularly tough times. "I guide people through their feelings and emotions," Noel says, "helping them make sense of their challenges."

He refers to the main issues many men face as "the 5 Ds": depression, desperation, divorce, dementia, and death. Noel's work involves unpacking these challenges, giving men the support they need to feel heard and understood.

For Noel, supporting mental wellbeing is about caring for the heart of Australia, and he is proud to stand with those in the bush.
